

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Course Overview:	This course places emphasis on studio work with the integration of art history. Students will investigate a range of mediums and techniques in art making that will help them to learn and develop technical and mental skills that will aid them in their growth as artists. This course also requires the students to begin to use sketchbooks as a way to work through visual problems. Part of becoming an artist is to learn how to offer and accept positive criticism, and students will be required to participate in class critiques of peer art. Students are expected to come to class prepared and on time. Attendance and punctuality is expected in this class, as we will be covering new topics daily. Daily attendance, positive attitude and respect are expected in this course.

Assessment:	<ul> <li>Guidelines for Assessment</li> <li>Due Date: the expected date for the assignment to be turned in. This can be determined by the teacher.</li> <li>Deadline: the absolute last day the assignment can be turned in. This is determined by when the graded assignments are returned. In some cases, the due date and the deadline can be the same date.</li> <li>Extensions: students who want an extension must make arrangements with the teacher prior to the due date and must have their assignment completed prior to the deadline. By having a deadline, students who require an extension will not interfere with the timely return of assignments to other students so that the assignment can help students with their learning.</li> <li>Late Assignments: when a student chooses to hand in an assignment after the due date but before the deadline, it will be accepted without grade penalty. It is reasonable to record NHI if the deadline is not met.</li> </ul>

Appeals Procedure:	Should a situation arise where you are not satisfied with an assessment outcome, first discuss the matter with me outside of class time. #### #1 Due October 10th

- 2 hrs of work minimum (Indicate the date, time & title on the back of each page)
- Create an Art 20 cover page: It must include your name, course name and it must be creative and colourful.

#### AND Complete a minimum of 3 of the following

- Shade a variety of different shapes or objects on a page
- Create a fall page using leaves
- Doodle several small pictures or cartoons on a page
- Design the border of a page with things about you, then ask friends, family and teachers help you write positive comments about yourself.
- Create a page that resembles a stained glass window
- Use colour to create a drawing with a specific mood or feeling. (Describe your attempt on the back)
- Copy the outline of a picture and change the shading and/or colour of it.
- Draw and shade a large eye in black and white or colour

- Draw and shade or colour a face or an entire animal (real or imaginary)

Sketchbooks will be graded according to completion and effort. These sketchbook assignments are intended to help you improve your drawing skills and generate ideas for projects. Sketchbooks can be worked on any time at home, during spare time, or during class when other art projects or assignments are completed.

\*You may choose a number from the sketchbook ideas document to complete in lieu of any of the bullets in your above requirements or to help you with extra ideas.

#### Classroom Conduct:

- It is important for students to come to class on time and prepared.
- It is the responsibility of the student to meet pre-determined deadlines.
   Deadlines will be discussed in class and students are responsible for making sure their work is handed in accordingly. There will be no extra class time given after the due date.

## Only Projects that have been created and finished in class will be marked, with the following exception.

 Only the research project, the poster project and the sketchbook can be taken home for completion.

You may need to spend time in the classroom over lunch and after school if you miss any classes and/or if you work at a slower pace.

Rational- This is to insure that all major projects that are assessed are completed solely by the student receiving the mark.

#### Late Policy:

Students must be on time for class. They are expected to be in class at the bell. Students that miss 25% of the class will be marked absent. (10 min for 40 min class, 20 min for 80 min class)

Students who are consistently late will receive contact home and possible meetings with administration, to ensure their success.
