Course	This course places emphasis on studio work with the integration of art history. Students will investigate a range of mediums and techniques in art making that will help them to
	learn and develop technical and mental skills that will aid them in their growth as artists. This course also requires the students to begin to use sketchbooks as a way to work through visual problems. Part of becoming an artist is to learn how to offer and accept positive criticism, and students will be required to participate in class critiques of peer art. Students are expected to come to class prepared and on time. Attendance and punctuality is expected in this class, as we will be covering new topics daily. Daily attendance, positive attitude and respect are expected in this course. <u>COURSE GOALS</u> (According to the Alberta Curriculum)
	 Drawings Students will acquire a repertoire of approaches to recording visual information. Students will develop the ability to investigate visual relationships in their recorded images and in the environment. Students will express technical competencies and individual insights. Students will apply visual, analytical and critical skills and develop control and competency.

	 Compositions Students will develop competence with the components of images: media, techniques and design elements. Students will analyze the relationships among components of images. Students will express meaning through control of visual relationships.

	 Students will investigate natural forms, man-made forms, cultural traditions and social activities as sources of imagery throughout time and across cultures.
	 Students will understand that the role and form of art differs through time and across cultures. Students will understand that art reflects and affects cultural character.
Fees:	There is a \$25 fee for this course. One coil bound sketch book will be provided.
Student	All materials are provided, but students may bring their own, if desired. If special items for a project are required, the student must bring their own.

Assessment:	 Guidelines for Assessment Due Date: the expected date for the assignment to be turned in. This can be determined by the teacher. Deadline: the absolute last day the assignment can be turned in. This is determined by when the graded assignments are returned. In some cases, the due date and the deadline can be the same date. Extensions: students who want an extension must make arrangements with the teacher prior to the due date and must have their assignment completed prior to the deadline. By having a deadline, students who require an extension will not interfere with the timely return of assignments to other students so that the assignment can help students with their learning. Late Assignments: when a student chooses to hand in an assignment after the due date but before the deadline, it will be accepted without grade penalty. It is reasonable to record NHI if the deadline is not met.
Appeals Procedure:	Should a situation arise where you are not satisfied with an assessment outcome, first discuss the matter with me outside of class time. If we are unable to resolve the issue, then I will approach another teacher to assess the assignment. (The teacher will not have prior knowledge of the student's name or the previous grade for the given assignment). If there is still an issue, a meeting will be set up between the student, teacher, parents and administration to resolve the matter. The commencement of an appeal must occur in a timely manner; within 48 hours of receiving an assignment. In return, the appeal process will be completed as soon as possible.

Late Policy:	Students must be on time for class. They are expected to be in class at the bell. Students that miss 25% of the class will be marked absent. 	Projects completed or started at home without permission, will be considered as projects towards the sketchbook grade.
