Course Overview:	This course places emphasis on studio work with the integration of art history. Students will investigate a range of mediums and techniques in art making that will help them to learn and develop technical and mental skills that will aid them in their growth as artists. This course also requires the students to begin to use sketchbooks as a way to work through visual problems. Part of becoming an artist is to learn how to offer and accept positive criticism, and students will be required to participate in class critiques of peer art. Students are expected to come to class prepared and on time. Attendance and punctuality is expected in this class, as we will be covering new topics daily. Daily attendance, positive attitude and respect are expected in this course.

Fees:	There is a \$25 fee for this course, and a coil bound sketch book must be purchased if you no longer have the one given to you in Art 10. Any new student to the school will be provided with one sketchbook at no extra cost.			

Assessment:	 Guidelines for Assessment Due Date: the expected date for the assignment to be turned in. This can be determined by the teacher. Deadline: the absolute last day the assignment can be turned in. This is determined by when the graded assignments are returned. In some cases, the due date and the deadline can be the same date. Extensions: students who want an extension must make arrangements with the teacher prior to the due date and must have their assignment completed prior to the deadline. By having a deadline, students who require an extension will not interfere with the timely return of assignments to other students so that the assignment can help students with their learning. Late Assignments: when a student chooses to hand in an assignment after the due date but before the deadline, it will be accepted without grade penalty. It is reasonable to record NHI if the deadline is not met.

The self-evaluation may be included as a percentage of the grade awarded on the projects, if it is deemed reasonable. This is not done for skills projects nor the Final Projects. 	
Appeals Procedure:	Should a situation arise where you are not satisfied with an assessment outcome, first discuss the matter with me outside of class time. If we are unable to resolve the issue, then I will approach another teacher to assess the assignment. (The teacher will not have prior knowledge of the student's name or the previous grade for the given assignment). If there is still an issue, a meeting will be set up between the student, teacher, parents and administration to resolve the matter. The commencement of an appeal must occur in a timely manner; within 48 hours of receiving an assignment. In return, the appeal process will be completed as soon as possible.

<u>****Sketchbook Work & Deadlines:</u>

*This work should showcase your skills and interests. Although some will be sketches and planning pages, All the mini-projects you do for the completion of the bullets and choices must be compositions that you have thoughtfully completed to the best of your ability.

Finally... you must add extra pages to demonstrate your interests, skills, doodling or planning.

*Don't forget to label each choice and record the information on the back!

#1 Due October 12th

- 2 hrs of work minimum (Indicate the date, time & title on the back of each page)
- Create an Art 20 cover page: It must include your name, course name and it must be creative and colourful.

AND Complete a minimum of 4 of the following

- Shade a variety of different shapes or objects on a page
- Create a fall page using leaves
- Doodle several small pictures or cartoons on a page
- Design the border of a page with things about you, then ask friends, family and teachers help you write positive comments about yourself.
- Create a page that resembles a stained glass window
- Use colour to create a drawing with a specific mood or feeling. (Describe your attempt on the back)
- Copy the outline of a picture and change the shading and/or colour of it.
- Draw and shade a large eye in black and white or colour

#2 Due November 23rd

- 1. 2 hours of work of work minimum (Indicate the title & time taken on the back)
- 2. Draw a picture on the theme: Vacations or Holidays **AND Complete a minimum of 4 of the following**
- Use layers of colour and masking tape to create a fun abstract
- Create a scribble drawing
- Do a page with your fingers and chalk, charcoal or paint
- Draw a page inspired by a video game
- Create a page with pencil crayons, wax crayons and scratch tools
- Draw an animated character
- Create a tessellated page
- Draw and shade or colour a face or an entire animal (real or imaginary)

#3 Due January 11th

- 1. 2 hours of work of work minimum (Indicate the title & time taken on the back)
- 2. Do a composition that deals with the theme- Entertainment

AND Complete a minimum of 4 Choices from the Sketchbook ideas document. Sketchbooks will be graded according to completion and effort. They must be dated titled and the time spent on each piece must be recorded on the back of the page the artwork is on. These sketchbook assignments are intended to help you improve your drawing skills and generate ideas for projects. Sketchbooks can be worked on any time at home, during spare time, or during class when other art projects or assignments are completed.

Classroom Conduct:	 It is important for students to come to class on time and prepared. It is the responsibility of the student to meet predetermined deadlines. Projects will be graded on whatever is completed on the due date. Missed assignments and extensions for completion may be permitted with a valid reason. 			
	Projects must be completed at school. Only in special circumstances will permission be granted from the teacher to complete some part of a special project, if that project cannot be completed in the school.			
	Projects completed or started at home without permission, will be considered as projects towards the sketchbook grade.			
	Sketchbook work is to be completed at home, or during spare time in class.			
Late Policy:	Students must be on time for class. They are expected to be in class at the bell. Students that miss 25% of the class will be marked absent. (20 min for 80 min class) Students who are consistently late may receive contact home and possible meetings with administration to ensure their success.			
Attendance Policy:	As per school policy, daily attendance is expected. A parent/guardian should contact the school for all excused absences. Missed class time equates to projects needing to be completed at a faster pace. There is no extra free time in the day to make up days that a student is absent. That includes any time students are pulled out for any other reason. Contact home may occur if a student has too many absences.
